We have recently received feedback from our Safeguarding Quality Assurance Visit which took place in June. This was conducted by an external agency and highlighted many strengths to celebrate and share...

been wonderful to see so many pupils looking smart in their school PE kits on PE days.

- Behaviour in school is excellent; children are focussed and on task. Classrooms are engaging and welcoming, there is a clear child centred focus with a strong emphasis on relationships.
- Staff know children very well and can identify triggers and intervene as early as possible to de-escalate any situations arising. This is strengthened further with staff present on the school yards at break and lunchtime.
- Children are supported in regulating their emotions and thinking about the interventions they require when experiencing any difficulties.
- At the end of the day, staff are well zoned on the doors and at the gates and are visible for handing children over. Although the site is extensive, the high visibility of the staff on the gates is effective and improves relationships with children and parents alike and reduces incidents.
- Parents and children have bought in to the school behaviour policy and respond well to communication on see-saw.
- There are now children with 30 different languages who access the school. In discussion with children, they described this as a real strength of the school, feeling valued, supported in their cultural identity and very much involved with school life. Children are happy at school, they feel safe, valued and very much a part of school community. Children can approach all staff for support confidently. Children feel information is communicated well with home.
- Children enjoy an inclusive curriculum and an opportunity to share information about their lives and cultures. Children described their school as: having variety, amazing, safe, comfortable, protective, welcoming, diverse and inclusive!

Each week all pupils with 100% attendance for the week are awarded an Attendance Challenge Token which they then place in our token jars. There is one token jar for EYFS, one for KS1 and one for KS2.

At the end of each half term we choose tokens from each jar. Pupils who have their name drawn are able to choose prizes from the attendance prize box.

Last week we awarded 322 Attendance Challenge tokens to pupils with 100% attendance for the week. That's over 86% of the school, receiving a token!

Helpful Hints for Top Attendance

- Unless they are too ill to attend school, all pupils should be in school, on time every day.
- Whenever possible medical appointments should be made outside of school times. If a pupil has a medical appointment in school time you should provide the school with evidence. There is no need to stay off school all day for a medical appointment. If possible, your child should come into school at the start of the day to get an attendance mark for the morning session, and then return to school after their appointment.
- Pupils should not stay off school on their birthday.
- A leave of absence form must be completed for holidays. The school cannot authorise holidays in term time – such absences will be classified as unauthorised.
- Our Attendance officer is here to help. If you are struggling to get your child/ren to school on time, please contact school.

PE AT Archibald 2025-2026

Many pupils love their PE lessons, learn lots of new skills and knowledge and go forward to represent the school at a number of competitions with some fantastic results.

This year, PE will continue to be taught by **specialist PE teachers** from Macmillan Academy and MFC Foundation. In all lessons the Class Teaching Assistant will be assisting the PE teacher.

A school PE kit consists of dark blue or black shorts and a dark blue t-shirt which we expect all pupils to wear for PE lessons. In colder weather, pupils may wear tracksuit bottoms for outdoor PE. These should be dark blue or black wherever possible. Plimsolls or trainers are needed for outside PE.

Football kits, football shirts and branded sportswear are not appropriate PE kit and should not be worn.

In order to save time and make the most of each PE lesson, pupils should come to school in their PE kit on PE days. If the weather is cold they should wear their school jumper over the top and can wear plain navy blue or black jogging bottoms over their shorts.

Please make sure your child is wearing their PE kit in school on the correct days. We have spare kit available to lend if required.

Please help your child by ensuring all PE kit is named.

A letter to parents and carers form UK Prime Minister Kier Starmer



Dear Parent/Carer.

Across England, millions of children and families are beginning a new school year.

As a father of two, I know well the pride and joy of watching your children grow up. But I also understand how juggling parenthood, work and other responsibilities can sometimes be difficult especially when the cost-of-living is still tough, childcare is expensive, and your time is tight. Supporting families is at the heart of our Plan for Change. Over the past year we have started to deliver the change promised – new help designed to make your life easier and give your children the best possible start.

We are making high quality childcare more affordable by introducing 30 hours of government-funded childcare during term time, from the end of parental leave to the start of primary school, saving an average working parent up to £7,500 per year – money that stays in your pocket for your family's needs.

We are making family life easier too, with hundreds of school-based nursery places opening this September, and thousands more to come. This means more families can access government-funded childcare and perhaps manage with just one school run in the morning. This comes alongside expanding wraparound childcare available to you outside of school hours, including a free Best Start Breakfast Club which we will be rolling out in every primary school.

We are proud to build on the legacy of Sure Start through our Best Start Family Hubs, a growing network of welcoming spaces. Families can access a wide range of support and services to make the journey of being a parent a little easier – from expert advice on feeding your baby to how to support your toddler's learning and development at home.

Of course, this is just the beginning. This government will keep building support for you and your family to help make parenting easier and ensure no child's background dictates what they go on to achieve. I know that this is also a priority for local MPs and councils, who can provide more information about what is available in your area. I encourage you to get in touch with them directly.
